Teddy Roosevelt is credited with a number of great quotes that I reflect on often, but this one seems the most apropos for me as I reflect on four years with the Outdoor Lab Foundation.

Looking back on all that we have accomplished together and how we have achieved our success, it is in large part because of our incredible community of supporters. Thank you for being part of our community, for your generous gifts, for your time, and your partnership. Your support will be even more critical as we march forward in pursuit of an ever more impactful, meaningful, and relevant Outdoor Lab experience for all Jeffco students.

In the pages that follow you will see how we continue to stay true to the vision that guides us – an enduring program, inspired students, and cherished sites. This year, we have been able to deliver over \$420,000 in total contributions to Outdoor Lab. This includes direct cash contributions, in-kind donations and services, and volunteer labor.

Most importantly, we have remained focused on supporting schools and families through our Tuition Assistance Program. Over the past four years, we have made over \$760,000 in tuition assistance grants to ensure enrollment fees are not a barrier to participation for our under-resourced students.

We have increased the pace with which our mountain campuses are being maintained by increasing volunteer projects, hiring outside contractors ourselves, and coordinating with Jeffco's Facilities Department on important beautification, maintenance, and safety projects. We have also built a Career Pathways Program to invest more deeply in our Interns and High School Leaders. And we have supported our teachers by being more hands-on and involved in their trips so the planning process is less administratively onerous. Allowing them to focus on the experience and their students more directly.

I know we cannot reach these goals alone. I'm grateful to have you by our side. Real change is made by people, not projects. Whether you've supported us as a donor, volunteered for us at Windy Peak or Mt. Blue Sky, or participated in an event, your commitment has been instrumental in our success in connecting more young people to the outdoors.

For 14 years, Windy Peak was blessed to have Robb Gneiser serve as Principal. Robb served with distinction as a kind and thoughtful leader, a role model for students, and a trusted confidante and mentor for staff. In May 2024, Robb retired leaving a legacy few have matched nationally in the field of environmental education. It is estimated that Robb welcomed over 40,000 students to the Windy Peak campus during his tenure. Moreover, it was a family affair. Robb's wife Kari, and children Merritt and Sawyer, played paid and volunteer roles on the campus to keep it running well and ensured every weeklong camp was a fantastic experience for the students.



This past September, the Colorado Alliance for Environmental Education (CAEE) honored Robb with their Outstanding Retiring Environmental Educator Award. Simultaneously, the Outdoor Lab Program was recognized for CAEE's Advancing Environmental Literacy Award. Robb and the Gneiser family will be missed at Windy Peak but their influence on the program and on the thousands of students who fondly remember their time at Outdoor Lab will last for generations.

Q&A with Jeremy Brasher



We caught up with our new Windy Peak principal to talk about his experience at Outdoor Lab. Spoiler alert: It turns out great leadership is fueled by eggs, nature, and a whole lot of heart!

Q: What is your favorite meal in the dining hall?

A: I absolutely love having breakfast! It's so fun to talk with teachers and students during this time because it is most often very different than what they are used to at home. The conversations are real and you get to know everyone as individuals! The eggs are the best!

Q: Do you have a favorite place on campus?

A: There is something about sitting on the dock and looking over the pond that feeds my soul. Day or night it is a special place. The water brings so many different animals. Every experience is different.

Q: What drew you to outdoor education, and what do you love most about being the principal of an outdoor school?

A: I have always valued the power of what nature can do to educate myself and others. As a former Windy Peak attendee, my experience was life changing. It's in part why I pursued Natural Resources Management in college and was a volunteer firefighter for the Roosevelt National Forest Service. I'm so honored to have this position because it is so much more than just being a principal. It is an opportunity to advocate for the student experience and manage something I love so much.

Q: What excites you most about the future of Outdoor Lab, and what are you hoping to achieve in the coming years?

A: Windy Peak is a magical place! A place that exudes this such magic requires preservation and upgrading for future visitors. I plan to lead that charge and continue to make the experience for all visitors and staff amazing.

Career Pathways Highlights

One of the reasons Outdoor Lab has been so successful and beloved through the years is the culture of student leadership that has been instilled in the program. Each year, 40 Interns and 1,000 High School Leaders support the full-time teachers and staff at Outdoor Lab. These young adult mentors serve as instructors, teacher aids, role models, and land stewards to ensure the smooth operation of the program and a safe and impactful experience for all.

Thanks to a Colorado State Outdoor Recreation Grant, the Outdoor Lab Foundation has been able to more deeply invest in students who serve in these capacities. This seed funding allowed us to pilot our Career Pathways Program and, since 2023, the program has been building momentum.

This year, we were able to offer 100 CPR/First Aid/AED courses to High School Leaders. We increased the pay of interns from \$1,000 or \$1,500 per semester. We instituted Wilderness First Aid and Leave No Trace certifications for each intern. Moreover, High School Leaders still earn their 85 hours of community service which can convert to .5 elective credit. And, our partnership with Red Rock Community College ensures that interns can receive up to 6 credits in their Outdoor Education degree program. Lastly, we still offer three \$2,000 scholarships to our most stalwart and enthusiastic graduating seniors.



Going forward, we plan to offer more learning modules and certification opportunities through partnerships Colorado Alliance the with Environmental Education. Desert Mountain Medicine. NOLS. Outward Bound. We also plan to offer more professional networking and mentorship for our young leaders so they can continue to pursue their passions in the outdoor industry.



Site Support Highlights

Outdoor Lab's inspirational mountain campuses are the backdrop of every experience at Outdoor Lab. The Foundation's Site Support Program ensures that Mount Blue Sky and Windy Peak are maintained and improved so they may continue to host transformational outdoor experiences for thousands of Jeffco sixth-graders each year.

Appreciated securities or mutual fund shares you've owned for more than one year are excellent charitable gifts. Each stock gift we handle strengthens our programmatic work while providing tax benefits for supporters. Donating stock or securities offer numerous benefits: • A federal income charitable contribution tax deduction based on the stock's fair market value on the date of the gift (up to 30% of your adjusted gross income) if the stock was owned for more than one year; • Carryover of the deduction for up to five additional years if the fair market value of the gift is more than 30% of your adjusted gross income; and • Avoidance of capital gains tax that is due when you sell appreciated stock. Note: Stock owned for one year or less is considered a short-term asset and usually won't produce attractive tax benefits. We recommend that you consult with your attorney or tax advisor about the various tax benefits and restrictions that may apply to your specific situation. 




